



### INTRODUCTION TO THE INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF ART IN EARLY CHILDHOOD

The Association is a non-profit organisation that aims to connect those around the world who have an interest in the visual arts for young children.

### It aims to:

- Provide a forum for an exchange of ideas and research about young children and the visual arts
- Encourage and support the visual arts in early childhood contexts
- Connect researchers and practitioners in the field
- Support a biennial international conference of art in early childhood

The organisation is a big, joyful family of volunteers, artists, teachers, parents, researchers and educators who are passionate about the possibilities the visual arts hold for young children. This diverse group of people comes together at the International Art in Early Childhood Conference which is held every two years to celebrate, play and discuss art and young children.

### **HISTORY**

The first Art in Early Childhood Conference was held in London at Roehampton University in 2005. Margaret Brooks (University of New England, Australia) and Rosemary Richards attended this conference and realised that this was too good to be a one-off event. Consequently, the International Association of Art in Early Childhood was formed in 2007 and the conference was delivered in 2007 at the University of New England in Australia. The International Art in Early Childhood Research Journal was established in 2009. Subsequently, conferences have been hosted in the USA (2009), Singapore (2011), Cyprus (2013), Hong Kong (2015), Bhutan (2017), New Zealand (2019), Online symposium (2021), and England (2023). This year's conference in Australia is the 10th International Art in Early Childhood conference.

### 10th International Art in Early Childhood conference, Wollongong, Australia 2025

VISUAL ARTS PEDAGOGY: Connecting with self, place, culture and community.

At the heart of early childhood visual arts lies a rich tapestry of connections between children, their environments, and the cultural contexts in which they learn. Such connections shape children's perceptions and understandings of the world and provide meaningful opportunities for them to communicate their ideas, questions and thinking with others.

This year's Conference presentations and workshops explore the educational contexts that nurture children's connections with materials, environments, people, and places, and examine the multiplicity of relationships that are fostered at the intersections of visual arts pedagogy and rich early childhood learning.

Presentations and workshops will focus on the following sub-themes. Rather than being presented in thematic blocks, the 'connections' themes will be spread out across the conference sessions.

### VISUAL ARTS CONNECTIONS — PEDAGOGY AND EDUCATION

- How can visual arts be holistically integrated into early childhood education, fostering not only artistic skills but also cognitive, linguistic, social, and emotional development?
- How do visual arts connect with educational inquiry processes, and what insights can they offer into enhancing learning experiences for young children?
- In what ways does higher education research contribute to our understanding of the connections between visual arts and early childhood education?

### VISUAL ARTS CONNECTIONS — CULTURE, COMMUNITY AND PLACE

- How do educators embed the arts to empower children's connections with, culture, community and place?
- How might visual arts pedagogy be guided and inspired by local Indigenous knowledges and connections to Country?
- How can children's creativity and imagination be nurtured through encounters with materials, nature and the environment?


 How can visual arts foster connections to Country and place, honouring cultural heritage and promoting environmental stewardship within early childhood communities?

### VISUAL ARTS CONNECTIONS - NURTURING SELF, WELLBEING AND IDENTITY

- How does visual arts education nurture well-being and promote mental health and emotional resilience for children and their communities?
- In what ways can visual arts foster mindfulness where children are fully immersed and present in the moment?
- How does expression through visual arts experiences contribute to building identity for young learners and the adults in their lives?
- In what ways can visual arts experiences support autonomy and give voice to children's diverse ways of being, doing, thinking and communicating?

### Conferences with a difference


A few changes to the traditional format of a conference were made at the 7th Art in Early Childhood conference in Bhutan in 2017. For example, the conference was made more democratic and financially affordable by choosing not to have keynote speakers. The 8th International Art in Early Childhood conference maintained this priority to equally value the voices of all presenters and introduced the concept of Brilliant Bursts (whole conference discussions with three specialist speakers), an inclusion re-introduced for the 2025 conference.




